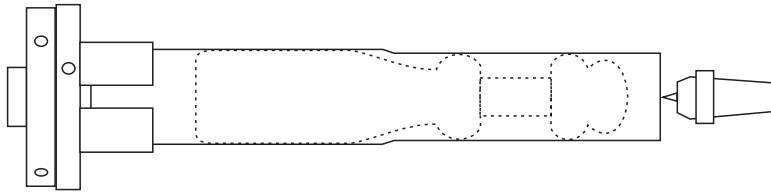


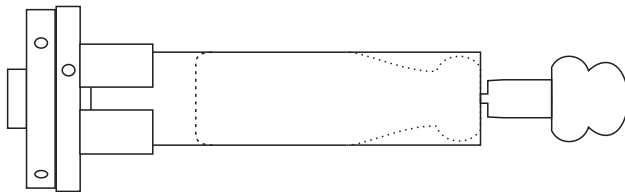
Lavender Bottle

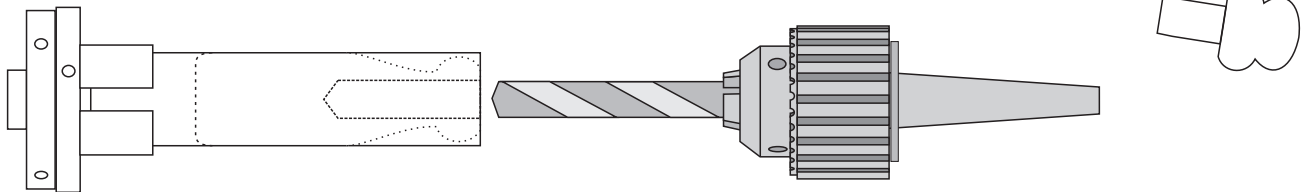
This is a little wooden bottle into which no more than two drops of lavender oil are dropped to perfume a handbag, drawer, cupboard or car.



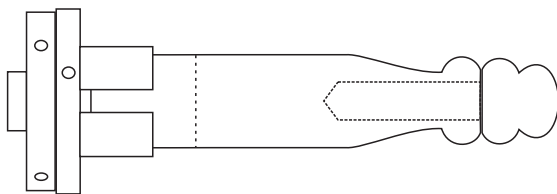
Start with a piece of wood 120 long and 20mm square. Mount it in a pin jaw chuck and bring up the tailstock. Turn the tailstock half of the wood to round and just take the square corners off the other half.



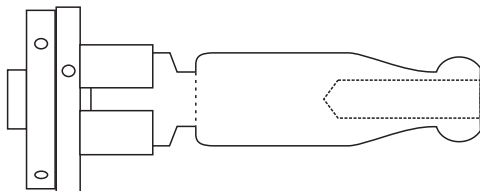
Shape the stopper part. The diameter of the straight stopper shaft is 8mm but you may make a little sloping cut towards where it will be parted off. Take the tailstock away and shape the very end of the stopper knob. Sand and finish all this area. Part the knob and stopper shaft from the body of the bottle. Sand the end of the stopper shaft.



Drill an 8mm hole about 30mm down into the body of the bottle. Fit the stopper to this hole, sanding or using a rasp inside the hole if needed.



Keep the stopper in and cut the neck of the bottle. Make the bead sizes progressive.



Start the parting-off cut. Sand and finish all surfaces. Complete the parting-off cut and then hand sand that area.

Put no more than two drops of lavender oil in the bottle and fit the top.
